
Khalilah's Story

As a kid I always wondered why we would move so much, and it was not until I was 14 that I understood. Fourteen was an age to remember, it is where I realized that my mom was maybe overwhelmed and her life was moving faster than she thought it would. Soon after all of the moving around town my mom realized she was out of options. I was missing days of school. My guidance counselor wanted to know what was going on and I told her. I believe my brother told her as well and from there, she met with my mom. My mother did not want us in the system. She did not want us separated so my guidance counselor found three of my siblings and me a place where we could call home—a place where we can still keep in contact with our mom, a place where we would be safe, a place where things would be stable. That place is called Epworth.

Thanks to Epworth, I was sheltered in a supporting environment where I was able to grow and benefit

During the fourth week in January Epworth Children's Home was the host site for the South Carolina Methodist Youth Basketball Tournament. Teams from across the state gather every year to compete, worship, and make new friends. Epworth entered three teams in the tournament this year. The senior girls, the senior boys, and the junior boy's teams participated. All of the teams played hard and well, but by Saturday afternoon it was evident that if a trophy was to be won the junior boys team had the best chance of claiming a prize.

Volunteer coaches and Epworth staff members Terry Gainous and Taylon Holmes had the boys playing their best ball. Two more games to go to remain undefeated and make it to the championship game. They won the first one on Saturday evening, then late Saturday night they won again. Excitement reigned supreme; although I am not certain what excited the boys more, winning or the late night pizza supper that was waiting on them. One player shouted, "We are playing for the championship!" Another player shouted, "There is all the pizza we can eat downstairs!" Louder cheers erupted as the team disappeared down the stairs.

Sunday morning was a bit calmer as players, coaches, parents, youth chaperones, and the Epworth residents gathered in the Epworth gym for a community worship service. Volunteers from Chapin UMC's Praise Band provided uplifting music and Bishop Holston preached an excellent sermon as he reminded us why we were gathered together and what is really important in life. Some of our senior boys were so impressed they asked Bishop Holston after the service where his church was. It seems they wanted to go to his church and hear him again. That is high praise from a group of older teenagers.


Sunday afternoon arrived. Game time. The junior boys looked small in the Dreher High School gym. The other team looked bigger, stronger, faster, and they were. Our junior boys were beaten pretty soundly. They were discouraged, rallied, and then lost by a fairly wide margin. It took them a few minutes to recover. They

congratulated the winning team members and watched the champions receive their medals. The something amazing occurred. The Epworth boys lined up at center court and were presented with Runner's-Up medallions. The look of pride and the sense of accomplishment was evident by the smiles on their faces and the way the players gazed at the medallions they wore.


This small chapter in the life at Epworth captures what happens here every day. Miracles upon miracles occur as children and youth discover the God given potential in themselves and in others that they never even dreamed existed. Children and youth experience the highs and lows of life yet take the next step and then the next. And they learn not to give up, not to give in, and to believe in the future.

The Annual Report issue of *The Record* is mainly about the past year. As you can see we had an outstanding year in many ways. A few of the highlights are as follows:

- Continued to create a **culture of success** which is reflected in the following statistics: For the fourth year in a row Epworth's high school students graduated at a 100% rate; 96% of residents had two or fewer behavioral referrals at school; 92% of students had a "C" average or better each quarter; and 43% of students earned academic honor roll each quarter.
- Received the **coveted 4-STAR rating from Charity Navigator for sound fiscal management,** and commitment to accountability and transparency for the fourth year in a row. Fewer than 14% of all charities in the country receive the 4-star rating three or more years in a row.
- Became **nationally accredited** for a period of four years by the Council on Accreditation (COA) for Epworth's outstanding children's resident group home program and services.
- Continued to expand the Higher Education / Independent Living program by adding two full time







case workers and additional financial resources. This program is designed to serve a growing population of youth between the ages of 17 and 22 who are "aging out" of child care, yet need additional supervision, resources, guidance and a safe place to live.

This issue of *The Record* also points to the future. After much thought, planning, and prayer, the Epworth Board of Trustees voted to purchase the 19 acre campus and the 14 buildings that comprise Carolina Children's Home. This purchase was made to facilitate the growing need for children's services that Epworth provides. This acquisition gives Epworth a second campus from which to operate and is only 1.6 miles from the main Epworth campus.

Several programmatic initiatives that can be housed on the additional campus as funding becomes available are:

1) Expansion of the Independent Living/Higher Education program for older residents as they make the

transition from high school to college or job training programs.

- 2) Create the Center for Excellence in Foster Care and Adoption where potential foster and adoptive parents are recruited, trained, and supported through church congregations in South Carolina.
- 3) Create the Center for Child and Family Wellbeing which could encompass a wide array of services for children, families, and professionals working in child welfare careers. This center would strengthen Epworth's continuum of care approach by adding resources and services not yet available to many children and families.

I invite you to read this Annual Report with thankful hearts for resilient children, and then look toward the future with optimism and with belief that new miracles will continue to occur every day.

from the many opportunities awarded to me. As a resident there, I learned things about myself that I did not know.

When I arrived to Epworth I felt a sense of security. Once I settled in, for the first time in my life I felt like I had control of my life. I was always independent even as a child, I had responsibilities as a child and I always made sure everything was alright. When I settled in at Epworth things were different. I did not have to look after my siblings, I did not HAVE to make sure everything was alright. My responsibility was taking care of me.

Epworth enhanced my leadership skills. There were times where I thought I would not make it. For example, graduating high school. I was not too excited as the other girls in my cottage were to graduate high school. I was more worried, more afraid; afraid that I was going to be alone. For the first time in my life I opened up to a stranger about my fears and my worries. This stranger ended up being my confidant, this stranger ended up being an important person in my life and she was my case manager/cottage coordinator at Epworth, Ms. Ieshia Gee.

Ms. Gee has ensured me that life after high school would give me a chance to grow and learn more about myself. She said to walk out on faith and not by sight. Which meant to me it might seem scary but with God I cannot lose. She told me about Epworth's Higher Education program, which I was fond of and decided to look more into. After graduation I decided to join the Higher Education program where I met Mrs. Laurie Brandes, our Higher Education director. Mrs. Brandes is another person at Epworth who has taught me a lot and helped me see something in myself that I did not see at the time.

After high school I attended Midlands Technical College where I majored in Human Services and then later changed to Business Administration. At that time I was unsure about a lot of things other than my major, and my grades were not great. I had a talk with Mrs. Brandes and it was not a normal chit-chat like we usually have. It was more motivational. I took her words and kept them in mind as I chose to transfer to another school. I needed to grow up, I needed to be at a distance and transferring to a school 45 minutes away made me sure of everything. That is where I learned about resilience. I learned that I had setbacks but no matter how many times I got knocked down, I bounced back ready for more. I locked fear away and threw away the key.


Epworth has put some amazing people in my life, people that do not believe in just doing their job, but doing more than their job. Sometimes I do not think that they know that they are impacting someone's life on a day to day basis—that they are molding and shaping a person into something totally opposite of what they are used to.

I do not think that THEY knew that they have impacted my life in a major way. I was nervous, scared, and afraid of my future. Epworth has made me realize that I have control over my future and with their moral support I went after my future. I will continue to harvest all lessons and blessings for I've been encouraged to become more than where I came from.

a Legacy of Respect, Love and Service



Mr. J. W. Hendrix's legacy will continue for generations to come through his planned gift to the Epworth Endowment.

Respect each other and play by the rules and you'll be alright." These words sound like good advice we might give our children here at Epworth. Yet, they were spoken by Mr. J.W. Hendrix a few years ago when asked about his recipe for being a good citizen. Mr. Hendrix's words are simple, yet very wise, and they are words he followed in his own life as he built successful businesses and served as a leader in his community.


Epworth is most fortunate that Mr. Hendrix provided a substantial gift to Epworth in his will. His generosity will allow us to develop programs and services that will help instill his legacy of respecting others in our Epworth children for years to come.

J.W. Hendrix lived in the West Columbia area for his entire life. After serving in the Navy during World War II, he returned home and soon took over the operation of a grocery store and gas station on Augusta Highway. Over the years, he expanded his grocery business to several stores, but he always gave his customers personal attention and much kindness.

His "flagship" store that had the most impact on his West Columbia community was the Hendrix Red

and White Grocery and Hardware. Customers there could buy groceries, gas, all kinds of hardware, and even ride Sandy, his famous mechanical riding horse, for one dime. Best of all, Mr. Hendrix's customers remember his friendly service and his dedication to providing them with a neighborhood store that could meet all their grocery and hardware needs. His store even served as an official polling place during elections. In an age when huge superstores and impersonal chain stores have taken over most of the business landscape, people fondly remember Mr. Hendrix's interest and enthusiasm in making sure his stores were focused on local customer satisfaction and service.

J.W. Hendrix displayed leadership throughout his community, serving on Lexington County Council, numerous community committees, and as a co-founder of the statewide Food Retailers Association, a network of local grocery stores that worked to provide better quality standards and service to customers. He was an active member of Mt. Hebron United Methodist Church and served on many committees there over the years.
