

Under the leadership and guidance of her cottage staff (and a little tough love), Sara made the difficult decision to cut off the toxic relationships she had been holding on to. It was hard, but it was worth it.

few days ago a teacher from Dreher High School called Epworth and stated that guests were going to be limited to two people per graduate this year at the commencement service. That meant that the crowd of us who usually attend the graduation ceremony could not attend this year. She then asked if she could bring yard signs by and put them in front of the cottages where each Epworth senior lives.

In a few days signs appeared on campus that contained the name of each graduating senior and a congratulatory message from Dreher High School. All of us are inspired and proud as we see the signs as we walk through the campus. Although we can't attend the service, we can still have feelings of pride.

The pride stems from memories of young people who came to our campus alone and apprehensive, and who have overcome obstacles that no child should have to overcome at such a young age. And, in spite of the rutted paths they have traveled, they have prevailed. So, are they ready to go out and conquer the world? Well, not quite. Statistics tell us this is where many youth in care falter, so Epworth has carved out additional paths that lead to successful transitions for new high school graduates who are marching toward adulthood. These next paths may include college, or job certificate programs, encouragement, mentoring, supervised living in a college-like dormitory arrangement, financial aid, nutritious meals served in a family-like environment, career guidance, opportunities for spiritual enrichment, and accountability for behavior and for reaching agreed upon goals. Every year a most interesting and inspiring cycle begins.

As you read this article my hope is that you feel a sense of pride, and are inspired by the accomplishments of the children you have supported and continue to support through prayers, gifts, and volunteer efforts. As part of the Epworth family your efforts help make all of this work. It is truly amazing how all the efforts of literally thousands of individuals come together to produce a young lady who walks out of her cottage one morning and notices a yard sign that reads, "Congratulations Anna! Dreher High School Class of 2020", and as she sees it, and as the big smile grows across her face she softly says, "I made it. Yes!"

As I stated before, Epworth has been blessed through all of this, and we continue to be strong financially, however we are behind in our customary funding by \$174,000 at this point. Roebuck United Methodist Church

Ruth "Missy" Earnhardt was the historian of Roebuck United Methodist Church and as one of the duties of the position she recorded its rich history beautifully in a twelve page booklet in 2004. Ensuring that the story was published so that generations of church members would know it was important to Missy. She believed that her church story deserved to be preserved as much as she desired for her own family story to be known by all who were called Earnhardt. The incredible life story that connects the two is that of Missy, a genuine Southern Belle who loved the Lord, her family, the church and Christmas.

Missy was born in 1925 in Roebuck, South Carolina to a large family with seven brothers and one sister. She was a young woman to be reckoned with. She found herself working in a man's world at a young age. Earnhardt Electric, the family business, is where she spent her entire career serving the business until her late 80s. The consummate Christian business woman, she believed in hard work and was a role model for others including her clients. Missy Earnhardt blazed the trails for young women while being the example of a Christian woman and a proper lady.

Missy served her Lord faithfully. She was a leader in Roebuck United Methodist Church having served in many positions including Sunday School teacher, Methodist

Youth Foundation leader, United Methodist Women and church historian. Epworth Children's Home held a special place in Missy's heart along with a number of other non-profit organizations. She was generous and believed in serving others, but children's issues were especially important to her. About 20 years ago, a group of ladies from Roebuck UMC visited Epworth's campus and this visit is when Missy fell in love with Epworth. The group saw first-hand the happiness on the faces of the children and knew by their smiles that Epworth Children's Home was a special place doing wonderful things for its residents. Missy was proud that her church supported Epworth annually and at levels higher than larger congregation churches.

The second Saturday in December was a special day for the Earnhardt family and one that was looked forward to all year long. You see, Missy's love was Christmas. She shared her family home at Christmas with many groups but having her family holiday party was the highlight of her year. She planned all year long, generally buying gifts in the summer and updating the collection of 80 plus crocheted stockings, to ensure that every family member knew how special they were to her. The family party was significant to the Earnhardt family story, one of love, togetherness and sharing memories from generation to generation.

Heaven gained this angel on December 17, 2018, but her legacy continues. Epworth Children's Home was recently notified of Missy's ultimate gift made through her estate plans. She planned the ending to her story by helping to ensure the future of Epworth through a planned gift. Missy established a legacy of generosity through her actions and through her gifts of time, talent and financial contributions to help to ensure Epworth's future. She will be posthumously invited into the Epworth Society of 1896 and her name will be engraved on the society roster.

On June 2nd, 2020 at 2:30pm, Epworth's Millwood Campus employees heard several sirens and saw emergency vehicles flying down the street. As people looked out the windows of other buildings around campus, they saw billows of smoke rising from the east side of campus. Upon further investigation it was discovered that the Industrial and Maintenance Building was in flames due to an electrical malfunction in the attic. Thankfully, no one was injured or hurt in the fire. The Maintenance Building is where Epworth stores the supplies for campus and the children in our care. Most of the children who come to Epworth come with very little, so upon arrival they are welcomed with a basket full of things like a pillow, sheets and a comforter, shampoo and conditioner, soap, toothbrush and toothpaste, towels, and other items so that they immediately have something to call their own and begin to feel a sense of home. Losing these items and this building was troubling, especially since supplies were already low to due to COVID-19 pandemic.

However, it is often said that the darkness of night helps the light of morning shine even brighter. From the moment 911 was called, the surrounding community and our Methodist churches have rallied around Epworth and supported us in so many different and amazing ways. The fire department was on the scene immediately, the news stations began sharing the loss and how to help, and churches, neighbors, businesses, schools and people from all over sprang into action. Despite the fact that the economy is hurting, people have given both supplies and dollars. Amazon wish list

items were ordered, monetary donations came in, prayers were prayed, and wish list items were dropped off less than 24 hours after the fire. Two days after the fire, the USPS mailman delivered 4 mail trucks full of boxes to Epworth. It was as though every delivered box was a brick and Columbia was laying the foundation and rebuilding what was lost, brick by brick and prayer by prayer.

The kindness and generosity poured out to Epworth is beyond words. This community is not just replacing supplies lost in a fire, but saying to the children of Epworth, "You are worthy, and we are here to make sure you have what you need." Thank you.

She is headed to college in the fall and wants to be a nurse with a minor in Psychology. Her staff have no doubt that she will be phenomenal at whatever she sets her mind to. Sara is a role model for the other girls in the cottage, with her even temperament and quick smile.

Return to Salkehatchie

Salkehatchie is a way of life. Salkehatchie is a love story. Salkehatchie gives us purpose. The summer of 2020 will be remembered in varying ways by all of us, but for many youth and adult volunteers across the Palmetto State, this summer will be a mournful summer due to the unfortunate cancellation of all Salkehatchie camps. With this, please enjoy the collection of life stories, love stories, and stories of purpose submitted by a Salkehatchie Summer Service youth volunteer from Epworth.

Salkehatchie is a summer service program where volunteers spend a week repairing homes for those in the community who have fallen on hard times. Volunteers from my DSS placement participate annually in June and we stay in a local church for a week while donating our time and energy to service. During our Salkehatchie week, we go to a house and complete various renovations, such as fixing the floors, painting the house, or installing a new roof. The homeowners are often in no condition to complete the necessary repairs and this is of no fault to the homeowner, they are often elderly or disabled which won't let them climb on a roof or tear out rotten floors. Salkehatchie means so much to me because it's a chance to give back to my community, honor my faith, and serve others.



My faith has always been my rock in weak times. I have had faith ever since I was a little girl. I have been in foster care since age 13 and the only way I am still getting through it is because of my knowledge that God is giving me the tools I need to grow and succeed. During Salkehatchie, faith is all you have sometimes as the work gets harder and exhaustion sets in. Salkehatchie also serves as a reminder to me of the blessings I enjoy every day. While being in foster care, it is hard sometimes to acknowledge the opportunities I am given and the luxuries I enjoy. When I am at Salkehatchie, I see the realities of a life that most certainly would have been mine had I not been removed from the situation I lived in before foster care. Salkehatchie always brings me closer to God because I see his reflection in the looks on the faces of the home owners and nothing could make me feel better. All the blood, sweat and tears that I put in over the week become worth it.

Salkehatchie is also significant to me because it fostered my passion to help people. I will give someone the clothes off of my



back if they asked for them, so being able to share my labor to enrich people's lives is something I love to do. In my first summer at Salkehatchie, I was repainting a wall when the homeowner came in and talked to me. He told me about his life, his military service and his combat injury that left him disabled permanently. He told me that he joined the military because he would rather lose his life than allow his fellow Americans to lose theirs; and he went on to say that he does not regret his service despite the lasting impacts on his life. At that moment, I knew I wanted to live a life serving others.

Salkehatchie is a moving experience for me each summer, and its roots grow deeper in me daily. I strive to live a life of compassion, service, and faith and plan to use these as a foundation when I step out into independence in the coming months. I want to share my God-given talents and make an impact in the lives of others. Salkehatchie has allowed me to see my true purpose and for that, I am forever thankful.

Salkehatchie may be canceled for 2020 but the service of Salkehatchie lives on as we share God's love each and everyday.


