When Betsy Jenkins became a single foster mom at age 27, after completing two degrees in social work, she never imagined that just a few years later she would be finalizing the adoption of two little boys, and that "Team Jenkins" would be a party of three.

For Ms. Jenkins, foster care has always been a passion. She became a licensed foster parent for a handful of reasons: she had the space, she had room in her heart, and she wanted to be a safe space in the storm for children. Ms. Jenkins has always been passionate about reunification and taken every step in her foster care journey to love and support birth families to the best of her ability.

When she got the call for 17-month-old Genesis, she was hesitant. Toddlers weren't her forte and Genesis was so small that the staff that called thought he was much younger originally. However, Ms. Jenkins said yes anyway and quickly adapted to having this little one in her home. While adjusting to life with a toddler, Ms. Jenkins received a call that Genesis's little brother was ready to be discharged from the NICU and they wanted to place little Micah in her home with his big brother. In less than 24 hours, she was picking him up from the hospital and bringing him home.

In the midst of the three of them learning to be family, tragedy struck. Micah got incredibly sick and was admitted to the hospital. Ms. Jenkins didn't leave his side as he fought for his life, and it was in those darkest moments that she realized what a

I grew up watching Mister Roger's Neighborhood and can still sing the opening song "Won't you be my neighbor?" I loved the characters, the puppets, and the stories they wove together to teach us important lessons on life. Mr. Rogers gave us many great quotes, and this one speaks to me about what we do here at Epworth: "Knowing that we can be loved exactly as we are gives us all the best opportunity for growing into the healthiest of people."

Epworth is a place that teaches hurting children, youth and families that they are loved exactly for who they are. We all have hurts and need to have hope restored by people who love us. Over the past few years at Epworth, I have seen staff, foster parents and our neighbors demonstrate this truth over and over again.

This year, we have been blessed to see many churches partner with us to support foster families in their work. They are being the church for their neighbors in beautiful ways. Smyrna United Methodist Church is a smaller congregation in the Charleston district with many "seasoned citizens." They asked if there was a way they could support a foster family in the neighborhood where most of their members live. As it turns out, we were able to connect them with one of our foster families that has a particularly challenging situation. The church is providing clothing, home equipment (like car seats), and checking in with the family to see what they might need from week to week. Babysitting? Meals? Prayers? Just as a neighbor would help a neighbor with day-to-day challenges, the church is checking on their neighbor and offering kindness and friendship. Smyrna UMC is one example among many, many churches striving to be good neighbors to the foster families in their communities and making a real difference in the lives of children by reducing the day-to-day stress and struggles that families face.


As you view the annual report that follows, I want to note a few key moments during 2021. We had many blessings last year, and with the blessings came a few disappointments. I hope you will enjoy reading our annual report and see the great things that are happening at Epworth.

- Epworth celebrated the completion of 125 years of service fulfilling our mission as a place that exists to serve children, youth, and families through caring, safe, communities, where hurts are healed; hope is nurtured; and faith in God, self and others is developed.
- The "Every Child is a Miracle" campaign closed at the end of 2021. It is exciting to share that the campaign ended at just over \$8,000,000. These funds will be used to continue transforming lives for God's most vulnerable children and families.
- We served over 1,000 children and families during 2021. Several programs, including foster care, early intervention, counseling services, independent living, and the HOMEBUILDERS® program set new records for the number of children and families served during a twelve-month period.
- Epworth continued the expansion of the Institute for Child and Family Wellbeing and opened new foster care hubs in the Rock Hill and Pee Dee areas. Our United Methodist partners created more office space in multiple churches around the state for staff to work.


#### Revenue

#### Circle of Parents®

Circle of Parents® is a peer-led parenting support group for parents and caregivers. It provides a safe place where anyone in a parenting role can openly discuss the successes and challenges of raising children and find ongoing support.

#### The Center for Independent Living

The Center for Independent Living served a record high number of clients in residence in 2021. All clients were either employed or in educational programs, or both at the same time. Admissions continued without pause during the ongoing pandemic. Many clients earned college credits and vocational training certifications.

Clients participated in additional life skills training including drivers' education and financial literacy.

#### **Family Care Center**

The Family Care Center serves mothers with substance use disorders and their children. The families live together for six months in a cottage on Epworth's campus and receive treatment as a family unit.

- Clients served: 20
- 9 Moms
  - > Age 18-24: 20%
  - > Age 25-64: 25%
- 11 Children
  - ➤ Age 0-5: 45%
  - > Age 6-9: 10%

The Family Care Center had 4 successful discharges, with families being reunified upon discharge.

#### **Residential Services**

The Epworth Children's Home residential care program serves children from South Carolina. Children come to Epworth after experiencing significant trauma like grief, loss, neglect and/or abuse and live with us on our campus in cottages with caring staff.

- Non-Duplicated Clients Served: 134 Nonduplicated
  - ➤ Age 0-9: 9%
  - ➤ Age 10-12: 10%
  - ➤ Age 13-17: 70%
  - > Age 18-24: 10%
- 59% of residents discharged from residential care were reunified with family or placed with a family member.

#### **HOMEBUILDERS** ®

HOMEBUILDERS® provides intensive, in-home crisis intervention, counseling, and life-skills education for families who have children at imminent risk of placement in state-funded care. It is the oldest and best-documented Intensive Family Preservation Services (IFPS) program in the United States. The goal is to prevent the unnecessary out-of-home placement of children through intensive, on-site intervention, and to teach families new problem-solving skills to prevent future crises.

### Columbia (Midlands) (Served families beginning May 2021)

- 15 families served
- Top three referring counties: Richland, Lexington, and Newberry.

### Greenville (Upstate) (Served families beginning June 2021)

- > 13 families served
- ➤ Top three referring counties: Greenville, Pickens, and Spartanburg counties.

### Charleston (Lowcountry) Served families beginning August 2021

- > 8 families served
- ➤ Top three referring counties: Charleston, Berkeley, and Orangeburg.

#### **Early Intervention Center**

The Early Intervention Center serves children with developmental delays and disabilities through the Home-Based Program as well as the on-campus Preschool Program. In the Home-Based Program, an Early Intervention Specialist visits the child and family in their natural environment to provide personalized services. In the Preschool Program, young children across a spectrum of needs learn new skills in a developmentally appropriate manner.

#### **Center for Counseling**

The Epworth Center for Counseling is an outpatient counseling center for children, teens, and adults. The licensed and trained therapists specialize in treating a variety of mental, behavioral, and substance use concerns.

Epworth licenses individuals and married couples across the state of South Carolina for both Family Foster Care and Therapeutic Foster Care. Foster families benefit from proven, research-based training and around-the-clock support from Epworth Foster Care staff members. The children who reside with private foster families can also benefit from participating in the many additional resources that Epworth offers to families across its array of programs.

## Epworth Academic Points of Interest 2020-2021

- During the 2020-2021 school year, 92% of residents tested below grade level in reading on initial assessment testing.
- By the end of the 2020-2021 school year, 66% of those residents had shown improvement in their reading scores on follow-up assessment testing. 8% of those residents improved their scores by more than a grade level.
- During the 2020-2021 school year, 78% of residents tested below grade level in math on initial assessment testing.
- By the end of the 2020-2021 school year, 59% of those residents had shown improvement in the math scores on follow-up assessment testing. 27% of those residents improved their scores by more than a grade level.
- During the 2020-2021 school year, 80 tutoring sessions were offered with an attendance rate of 65%. (Note: This number is significantly lower this year due to tutors being used to facilitate virtual school for the first 8 months of school due to COVID-19. Tutoring did not begin until February.)
- During the 2020-2021 school year, the tutoring center provided 10 tutors and a Career Counselor who served 105 residents.
- During the 2020-2021 school year, 75% of residents maintained an overall "C" average or higher.
- During the 2020-2021 school year, 96% of residents had 2 or fewer behavioral referrals during a quarter. (Data based on 1 semester only due to schools being virtual for 1st semester)
- 100% of seniors graduated or earned their graduation equivalency diploma (GED) at the end of the 2020-2021 school year. This is the 9th consecutive year with 100% graduation rate.

Note: Data for Assessment testing is based on residents who are at Epworth at least 90 days. We served a total of 105 residents in the tutoring program last year but only 38 residents are included in the assessment data.



village of people she had around her. Friends and family surrounded them in love, care, and met their practical needs each day without thinking twice. Slowly but surely, Micah got better, and the three of them left the hospital with an unbreakable bond.

As the case progressed, it became clear that reunification was not a possibility and the boys' parental rights were eventually terminated. The case moved toward adoption and Ms. Jenkins realized that these boys would be a part of her family forever. On adoption day they celebrated big, with Team Jenkins t-shirts, balloons, and signs. Yet in the midst of the celebration, they also held in their hearts a mourning for the boys' family of origin. It is not lost on Ms. Jenkins that the gain of her two sons in her home meant the loss of them in someone else's. Though the boys are young they will always know about "first mom" and "first family". Each year they celebrate family day, the day that the boys came to live with their new mom and they remember and are reminded of their first family. They read books about foster care and adoption and honor who they are and the family they came from.

Today, the boys are thriving. Genesis is fun and sassy and loves all things Disney. He went from being a little one who couldn't walk to constantly being reminded that kangaroo feet are for outside, since he loves to hop everywhere he goes. He is smart and thriving in school, making Ms. Jenkins proud every day. Sweet Micah went from

being a 2-pound preemie to a thriving, wild, 24-pound toddler. He is fearless, loving, and always willing to dance to "Baby Shark." They are loving life as a family of three and looking forward to the many years of memories to come.

For Ms. Jenkins, this adoption reminds her daily how lucky she is to have the boys, and how life works out in the wildest ways. She reminds us all that there is never a perfect time to say yes to something new and scary, that having a village of people to support you can make all the difference, and that the best life is often one you could have never imagined.

• Epworth established prevention programs across the state of South Carolina.

The major challenges last year were:

- The traditional residential population continued to see a decline as a result of the federal lawsuit that was filed against the state of South Carolina. The settlement requires that 86% of children and youth be placed in home-like settings and not group homes. In addition to serving fewer young people, the average length of stay has shortened dramatically over the past year. Youth are transitioning in and out of our home more rapidly than in years past. Although staff are always making impacts into the lives of the young people placed with us, shorter times in residence make it more difficult having the deeper connections to the youth.
- The pandemic continued to make it difficult to fellowship together and enjoy our volunteers and church partners on this campus. We were able to celebrate a few group activities during the fall, but it was short lived as the pandemic surged again. The pandemic has affected our youth educationally, socially and in their overall wellbeing. This issue is not specific to Epworth, but we have felt the effects of it here.

Although 2021 was a year of ups and downs with the pandemic and the challenges it brought, we are thankful for our neighbors and community. Thank you for helping us demonstrate love for children and families exactly how they are so "they may grow into the healthiest of people."







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
