Comeback Kid Charlie Sprints Ahead in School

We often use this space in *The Record* to highlight a special Epworth resident or to describe the exceptional progress one of our children is making. And while we will highlight an outstanding 10-year-old in this issue, we first want to first tell you about the Epworth educational service that is making a huge difference in his life and in the lives of many of our other residents.

Epworth's Barnes Learning Center has focused on the educational attainment of Epworth's children for more than 20 years. The Center provides a wide array of services, ranging from individualized academic tutoring in subjects across the curriculum, to SAT preparation courses for our high school age residents, to job market and life skills tutoring for our older youth. The services are tailored to each resident's individual academic and social needs.

National statistics indicate that most children who have experienced abuse and neglect in their homes fall, on average, between one-and-a-half to two full grade levels behind in educational attainment. When children arrive at Epworth to live, many fit this pattern, and they need assistance and personalized educational support outside of the classroom to help them catch up.

This is where the Barnes Learning Center's specialized services to Epworth's children make a huge difference. The Center augments what the residents learn at school and provides enrichment that helps them catch up in grade level attainment. It gives them the extra, personalized support they need to become successful and confident students for the first time in their lives.

Powerful Words Inspire Work that Changes Lives

A Message from Beth Williams
President

I was sitting in church recently and the words to a hymn washed over me and struck me with their relevance in my life today. When I heard the line, “What a powerful name it is, the name of Jesus,” I began to think of that power of Jesus’s name, especially as it applies to our life at Epworth.

The presence of Jesus is with us every day in our work here with our children, their families, and in communities throughout South Carolina. The lessons Jesus has taught us about love for one another; acceptance of one another, no matter our differences; and a generosity of spirit and kindness that allows us to treat one another with respect, compassion, and love, are the focus of our work at Epworth. As I heard the words to the hymn that day in church, I realized very clearly that what we do at Epworth every day recognizes and embodies what Jesus teaches us.

In a busy and complicated world, when we stop and remember what Jesus brings to us in advocating kindness, understanding, and genuine caring for one another, our positive outlook on life is sustained and we can work to help and support one another. This is the kind of love and support we endeavor to bring to our children and their families at Epworth, as well as to communities across South Carolina in which we have active programs and services to assist families.

As I write this letter to you, we find ourselves in the springtime of the year, a time of renewal and rebirth in nature, and symbolically, a time when each of us can cultivate a fresh sense of our own potential for growth and goodness. This is what all of us who work at Epworth will continue to do over the coming months, bringing the best of ourselves and the best of our professional experience to help the children and families who depend upon Epworth to stabilize, improve, and enrich their lives.

And it is my pleasure to bring to you a most positive message in this edition of *The Record* in which we recount our successes over the past year in our annual report. I am both proud and happy to tell all of you that Epworth is doing more than ever before in its 127 years of existence to aid South Carolina children and families whose lives have been marred by abuse, neglect, poverty, dysfunction, and other adverse factors.

Here are some of the successes that our fine staff at Epworth’s Columbia campuses and our regional locations have helped children and families to achieve and enjoy over the past year:

- Epworth served 124 children who lived in its residential program over the past year;
- Epworth’s Family Care Center programs also served 42 recovering mothers with substance use history and their children;
- Twenty-five older youth who would otherwise be homeless were provided with room and board, staff support, and assistance with college, the job market, and life skills training living in Epworth’s Center for Independent Living;
- The Center for Counseling treated 670 clients, both from Epworth’s various programs, and from the community at large.

- Epworth continued to establish foster care programs across the state, now administering six different programs in which 264 children and 164 families have been assisted, trained, and given the best of Epworth's staff and service and support over the past year;
- The Epworth Early Intervention Center assisted 116 preschool children, 91 in home-based programs and 25 on campus in the Epworth preschool, to receive special programming and educational strategies to help them prepare for kindergarten and early childhood educational programs. Children receive specially created individual education plans that address specific needs and deficits in their preparedness for school;
- Epworth's Circle of Parents, community-based self-help groups for parents, now has 16 groups established across the state, providing a chance for parents in challenging situations to share and help one another under the auspices of an Epworth facilitator;
- The Homebuilders program continues to be highly effective, bringing Epworth staff members directly into the home to help families in crisis learn parenting skills, life skills, and ways of managing family life in often challenging, critical situations. The program served 72 families in the past year;
- Epworth's Barnes Learning Center provided educational enrichment to children living on campus through its special tutoring programs to support and augment what they are learning in school. Over the past year, Epworth offered 2,322 individual tutoring sessions, assisting students in achieving grade level attainment. Children come to Epworth often more than a grade-level behind in their education; in the school year 2021-22, for example, 85% of the children entering Epworth tested below grade level in reading. Because of help at the Barnes Learning Center on campus, 61% had shown great improvement by the end of the school year, and 27% of this number had increased more than one grade level in reading skills. The same pattern holds true for math improvement;
- For the 10th consecutive year, 100% of Epworth's seniors either graduated from high school or achieved GED status. This is an amazing statistic that far exceeds the state graduation rate;
- Through its various continuing and latest programs, Epworth is highly attuned to the concept of Continuum of Care. This means bringing the best services and programming to our children and their families, meeting their needs in an evolving and continuing process. Through our residential services, our foster care services, and our community-based services, Epworth is bringing the best of care, support, education, and compassion to the children and families we serve.

This overview of our work at Epworth over the past year, which this edition of *The Record* highlights, reminds me once again of how the teachings of Jesus guide and permeate the work we do. The lyrics to the hymn that affected me so deeply that day in church remind me continually "what a powerful name it is, the name of Jesus." We strive to embody His teachings in the love, help, and support we provide to those we serve every day at Epworth. We are fortunate and blessed to have such a worthy outlet through which to follow and use what Jesus has taught us.



Investing in Care!

Circle of Parents®

Circle of Parents® is a peer-led parenting support group for parents and caregivers. It provides a safe place where anyone in a parenting role can openly discuss the successes and challenges of raising children and find support.

The Center for Independent Living

The Center for Independent Living serves clients ages 18-23 who are either employed or in educational programs, or both at the same time. Admissions continued without pause during the ongoing pandemic. Many clients earned college credits and vocational training certifications.

Clients participated in additional life skills training including drivers' education and financial literacy.

Family Care Center

The Family Care Center serves mothers with substance use disorders and their children. The families live together in a cottage on Epworth's campus and receive treatment as a family unit.

- Clients served: 42

 - Age 18-24: 16.7%
 - Age 25-64: 21.4%
- 25 Children
 - Age 0-5: 45.3%
 - Age 6-9: 14.3%
 - Age 10-12: 2.4%

The Family Care Center had 12 successful discharges, with families being reunified upon discharge.

Residential Services

Epworth Children's Home residential care program serves children from South Carolina. Children come to Epworth after experiencing significant trauma like grief, loss, neglect and/or abuse and live with us on our campus in cottages with caring staff.

- Clients Served: 124 (non-duplicated)
 - Age 0-9: 3
 - Age 10-12: 5
 - Age 13-17: 104
 - Age 18-24: 12
- 47% of residents discharged from residential care were reunified with family or placed with a family member.

HOMEBUILDERS®

HOMEBUILDERS® provides intensive, in-home crisis intervention, counseling, and life-skills education for families who have children at imminent risk of placement in state-funded care. It is the oldest and best-documented Intensive Family Preservation Services (IFPS) program in the United States. The goal is to prevent the unnecessary out-of-home placement of children through intensive, on-site intervention, and to teach families new problem-solving skills to prevent future crises.

Total families served: 72

Foster Care

Epworth licenses individuals and married couples across the state of South Carolina for both Family Foster Care and Therapeutic Foster Care. Foster families benefit from proven, research-based training and around-the-clock support from Epworth Foster Care staff members. The children who reside with private foster families can also benefit from participating in the many additional resources that Epworth offers to families across their array of programs.

Early Intervention Center

The Early Intervention Center serves children with developmental delays and disabilities through the Home-Based Program as well as the on-campus Preschool Program.

Center for Counseling

The Epworth Center for Counseling is an outpatient counseling center for children, teens, and adults. The licensed and trained therapists specialize in treating a variety of mental, behavioral, and substance use concerns.

Intensive In-Home Services

Epworth's Intensive In-Home Services (IIHS) is a four to six month program which provides an array of services and support to families who are involved with the SC Department of Social Services. IIHS works with families throughout four stages of service intensity in an effort to increase effective parenting, communication and coping skills through in-home counseling and additional behavioral services. This program began serving clients in December 2022

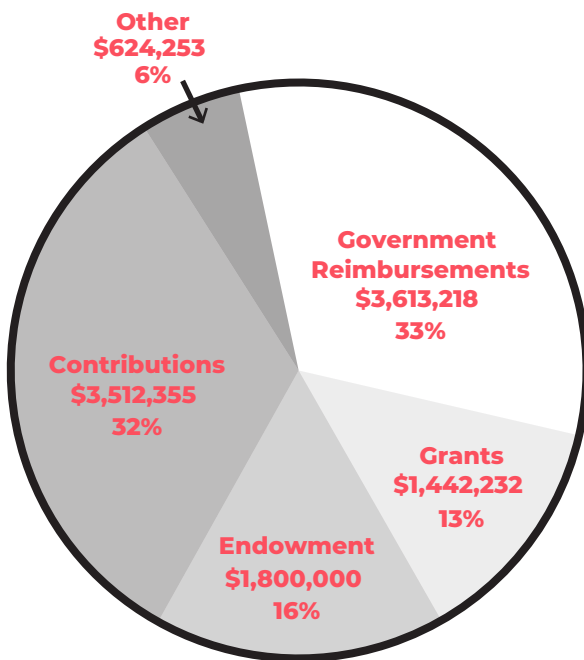
Epworth Academic Points of Interest 2021-2022

- During the 2021-2022 school year, 85% of residents tested below grade level in reading on initial assessment testing;
- By the end of the 2021-2022 school year, 61% of those residents had shown improvement in their reading scores on follow-up assessment testing, and 27% of those residents improved their scores by more than a grade level;
- During the 2021-2022 school year, 88% of residents tested below grade level in math on initial assessment testing;
- By the end of the 2021-2022 school year, 70% of those residents had shown improvement in the math scores on follow-up assessment testing, and 45% had improved their scores by more than a grade level;
- During the 2021-2022 school year, 2,322 tutoring sessions were offered;
- During the 2021-2022 school year, the tutoring center provided eight tutors, a career counselor, and an academic and behavioral coach who served 108 residents;
- During the 2021-2022 school year, 72% of residents maintained an overall “C” average or higher;
- During the 2021-2022 school year, 94% of residents had two or fewer behavioral referrals during a quarter
- 100% of seniors graduated or earned their graduation equivalency diploma (GED) at the end of the 2021-2022 school year. This is the 10th consecutive year with a 100% graduation rate.

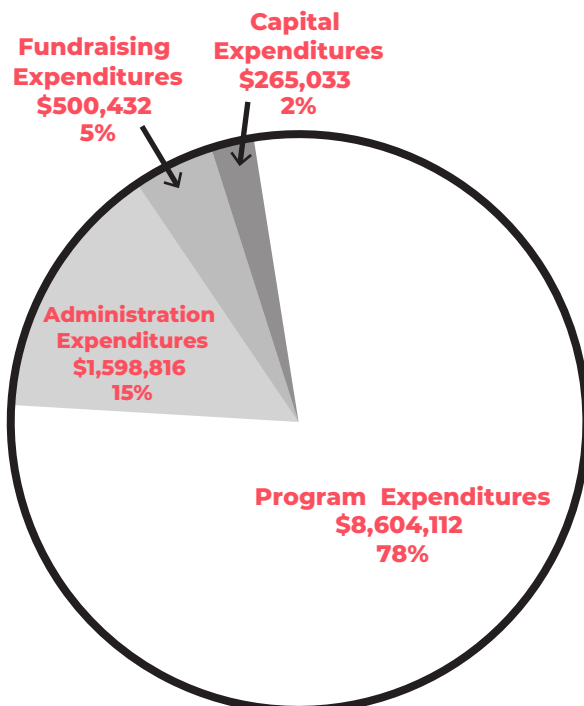
Note: Data for assessment testing is based on residents who are at Epworth at least 90 days. We served a total of 108 residents in the tutoring program last year but only 33 residents are included in the assessment data.

Epworth's Annual Mother's Day Offering
May 14, 2023

Charlie is a 10-year-old Epworth resident who exemplifies how the Center's services change lives. When Charlie arrived at Epworth in 2021, he was a second grader who had been identified as a student with a developmental disability. He struggled both academically and behaviorally in school and was having a particularly difficult time with basic skills in reading and math.

Like all our residents, Charlie attended the public school zoned for Epworth's location. Since the special education class placement Charlie needed was not offered at the elementary school to which he was zoned, Epworth staff in the Barnes Learning Center worked with a special education consultant to get Charlie placed in another elementary school in the district that offered the specific academic help he needed. Charlie also began tutoring at Epworth after school to receive additional support for basic reading and math skills that he needed to improve. Epworth's tutoring center continued to provide services to Charlie over the summer.

When Charlie's birthday arrived, he was no longer eligible for developmental disability services, and he had to begin transitioning to an educational program that would gradually place him in regular classrooms in some subjects, while retaining special education classes for support the rest of the school day. His schoolteachers helped him academically and also helped him to manage negative behaviors and the frustrations he frequently felt as he was mainstreamed into regular classrooms.

With continued tutoring after school in the Barnes Learning Center on Epworth's campus, and counseling to address his behavioral problems, Charlie gained confidence and began to work hard to attain grade level status. Both his academic performance and his behavior improved significantly.

When tests indicated that Charlie no longer needed any special education classes, he had to transfer schools, back to the elementary school to which he was originally zoned. Teachers there worked to make Charlie feel at home, and he has continued to receive extra support and help at the Barnes Learning Center. Christy Mooneyhan, director of Academic Achievement at Epworth, reports that Charlie's grades are excellent, and that he "continues to attend tutoring on campus every afternoon and has even asked to stay longer than his scheduled sessions to continue working on homework or improving his skills. He's thriving during his placement with us and it is because of the amazing support that has been wrapped around him."



Charlie's cottage parents at Epworth describe his willingness to help with chores in the cottage and to be a helper and friend to other children who live there with him. They comment about Charlie's positive attitude and his enthusiasm for life. Charlie's progress since his arrival at Epworth has been amazing. He has made huge strides in his academic levels and in his behavior, but most importantly, he seems to understand that he has a support system here that has allowed him to transform into a happy, healthy child who is full of life and believes in himself.
